I'm grateful for the story of Alma [the elder] in The Book of Mormon, his conversion story, and his people's path back to Zarahemla. King Noah had led the people into wickedness, with Alma being one of them. As Alma listened to the prophet Abinadi, he felt the Spirit testify of the truthfulness of his teachings and made the difficult decision to go against his peers and king. For that, he was not only removed as a member in the king's court, but also banished with his life sought to be taken. But, he was converted to Christ. He taught the people who would listen in secret, and ultimately left his home to worship God and live according to his newfound beliefs.



One would expect that Alma and his people's lives would be blessed for making the difficult decision to leave wickedness behind and embrace righteousness. However, they would be chased further, and after establishing a new community, be placed into bondage with impossible burdens placed upon their shoulders. Why? How is that fair? Shouldn't they be blessed for following Christ? As I ask myself those questions, I realize that those are common questions that I have asked when I feel like I am keeping the commandments and doing what's right, but find that heavy burdens are still placed upon my shoulders.

What we learn from the rest of the story is that as the burdens are placed on our shoulders, a particular miracle happens. As the people of Alma cried out to the Lord in their time of desperate need, the Lord said to them in Mosiah 24:14, "And I will ease the burdens which are put upon your shoulders, that even you cannot feel them upon your backs, even while you are in bondage; and this will I do that ye may stand as witnesses for me hereafter, and that ye may know of a surety that I,

the Lord God, do visit my people in their afflictions."

This one verse answers those questions about fairness. Burdens will come into our lives so that when we turn to Him, we may stand as witnesses that He visits us in our afflictions. I testify that this is true. I have felt those burdens lightened in my life through the atonement and grace of Jesus Christ. We all have access to that power, regardless of the burdens placed upon our shoulders. The burdens may not be removed, but they will be lightened, and for that I will be eternally grateful.

Charlene Juvan Schlegel was born in Kemmerer, Wyoming, and grew up and went to high


school in Bozeman, Montana. While living there she had a job as a waitress at the original JB's Big Boy.
